

Mike's Minutes

Rated **T** for **TEEN** — Parents strongly cautioned! I sympathize with parents who think they are ready for the long awaited transformation between puberty and adolescence. We think we know what is going to happen, but do we really? Think of this as a cross between **Godzilla, Lost in Space, and Invasion of the Body Snatchers.** To me, working with teenagers and parenting is, hands down, exponentially more frightening and suspenseful. I can say from experience that I'm convinced that nothing completely prepares a rookie parent for the extraordinary, mindbending, world-rocking, overwhelming experience of full-out adolescent emotional anarchy.



I only had one child of my own to actually raise, but I know from working with hundreds of other teenagers over the past twenty plus years in youth ministry that I rode the teenage roller coaster that has the g-force of Space Mountain and didn't come with a bar across the lap to keep you on board. The experience defies description. It's still a dangerous ride. It's frightening and ultimately, for me, has been an allout adrenaline-pumping, mind-blowing, God-glorifying experience.

So what's the formula of this thriller called Parenting Teenagers?

Typically, teenagers make unusual, unpredictable choices. You just never know what they will try next. Most of their stunts involve toilet paper, shaving cream, high-altitude leaps, cheap thrills, hair color, duct tape, and if possible on youth trips, it all happens around three in the morning. I've thanked my Heavenly Father many times for making me a heavy sleeper. It's amazing how the sins of my youth days seem to boomerang back to me, leaving a noticeable knot on my head. The past few years have left several battle scars from the teenage years. Here are a few of the major productions that a few traumatized parents have experienced and shared with me.

The Invasion of the Body Snatchers (7th & 8th Grade)

Plot: You wake up one morning and realize that the hormones and mood swings have abducted this cute little mini-you that used to live down the hall. Suddenly, this new resident looks at you as if you were a member of the cast of *Leave It to Beaver*. In a matter of weeks, the wash of hormones across the frontal lobe of your child makes you the most outdated, uncool, irrelevant person of the new millennium. In fact, you are now so irrelevant, he/she wants to be dropped off a few blocks from all social events. You now find yourself running through the streets of town screaming like a lunatic, "*Who stole my child*??!"

That's when parents usually come to the realization that they are no longer best buddies. They start looking for the empirical research of the other older and wiser experts and the youth pastor. Most teens are capable of swallowing any lie, taking any dare, and messing up their lives in a permanent way unless the parent puts on the parent hat. It's not cool, but it *is* required.

The Godzilla Factor (9th & 10th Grade)

As a rookie parent, you will see your child grow physically and intellectually, and you'll say to yourself, "*My child is getting it.*" No, they aren't. Not now...Not by a long shot...

It is then that you say that one syllable word that can throw any teenager into an all-out, melodramatic, door-slamming frenzy: "NO!" That's when the emotional Godzilla has risen from the depths of the Pacific. Throngs of parents have run for their lives! Doors slam and angry words spew forth from this once adoring child. The temperature rises and suddenly, life gets very difficult. (Now days this experience can be best understood in the 3-D, LED color of life.) Be afraid. Be very afraid.

Lost In Space—But Ultimately Found (11th & 12th Grade)

By now, you face the reality that life in the home has changed dramatically. It has probably challenged your universe. You'll learn and continue to learn and re-learn lots of biblical truth with practical applications. As a parent and youth director, I've learned, and so will you, that I can be assertive, even though I hate being assertive. I've learned that God's workshop is supernatural, and that He does most of His good stuff while no one is looking. I've learned that doing the right thing doesn't always guarantee success. But it's always the better road to take, even if it causes you pain. I've also learned this past year especially, that the older I get, the more important it comes not to mess it all up. People are watching. Especially the little kids down the hall. I can't let some stray thought, fantasy, or impulse bring my entire ministry to a screeching halt. Last, but not least, I've learned that the only time I have with our youth is right now, so I dare not miss this day. Parents, the worst-case scenarios rarely happen. And even if they happen, God is bigger than all of them. And His plot is more exhibiting than the wildest Hollywood script.
