Numbers 21:17

This well was famous in the wilderness because it was <u>the subject of a promise</u>: That is the well of which the LORD said to Moses, "Gather the people together, so that I may give them water." The people needed water, and it was promised by their gracious God. We need fresh supplies of heavenly grace, and in the covenant the Lord has pledged Himself to give us all we need.

The well also became <u>the cause of a song</u>: Before the water gushed out, cheerful faith prompted the people to sing, and as they saw the crystal fountain bubbling up, the music grew more joyful. In similar fashion, we who believe the promise of God should rejoice in the prospect of divine revivals in our souls, and as we experience them our holy joy should overflow. Are we thirsting? Then let us not grumble but sing. Spiritual thirst is bitter to bear, but we need not bear it. The promise indicates a well; so let us be of good heart, and look for it with our spiritual eyes.

Moreover, the well was <u>the center of prayer</u>: "Spring up, O well." What God has promised to give, we must seek after, or we show that we have neither desire nor faith. Let us ask that the Scripture we have read, and our devotional exercises, may not be an empty formality but a channel of grace to our souls. May God the Holy Spirit work in us with all His mighty power, filling us with all the fullness of God.

Lastly, the well was <u>the object of effort:</u> "The nobles of the people delved, with the scepter and with their staffs." The Lord wants us to be active in obtaining grace. Our implements are ill suited for digging in the sand, but we must use them to the best of our ability. Prayer must not be neglected. Restoration today is admitting that I am unsure of the future of my ministry. God knows it, and that's all that matters. And I'm OK with that.

Restoration today is all about trust in an unseen Hand that knows every inch of me and has seen the depth of my darkness and the burning light within me, also.

Restoration today is realizing that serving the Lord far outshines manmade happiness. And I may not ever see happiness in ways that I thought. But in the end, I get God. And I'm OK with that.

Restoration today is arriving at the conclusion that my greatest accomplishments in life will not be documented and my deepest wounds may never be seen by all. And although I shudder to think about how hard it is to stand in truth and do the right thing. I'm OK with that.

Restoration has nothing to do with savings accounts, diplomas, attendance records, or successes. Restoration is a daring passion that gives glory to God. It's saying, "I may end up penniless and alone with few possessions when I die. And I'm OK with that."

Restoration is found in the truth that God is slowly growing me to be someone who is comfortable in his story as a part of a much larger story of restoration. It's leaving my Babylon for unrivaled devotion to God. Restoration is simply saying, "Whatever You've got for me, Lord, I want it." It may cost me everything. But, you guessed it, I'm OK with that too.
